

CIRQUE DE LA SYMPHONIE

DESCRIPTION OF PROJECT

New West Symphony presents this year's **2024 Symphonic Adventures: Cirque de la Symphonie**, an educational and fun online orchestral experience for schoolchildren.

IMPACT: Symphonic Adventures is designed to help development in cognitive, social, cultural, and emotional capacities. It encourages students to seek and create new perspectives, perceive and know the world, and gain understanding that can shape the strength and wellbeing of society by viewing the world linguistically, scientifically, mathematically, socially and historically.

OBJECTIVES

- Develop musically literate students
- •Use music to communicate
- •Use music to create community
- •Use music and art connections to exercise emotional intelligence skills

OUTCOMES (students will gain)

- •Understanding of basic elements of music, identify orchestra instruments
- •Stronger understanding of musical instruments in the orchestra, how they are played, how each instrument creates sound, why they sound different when playing the same note.
- •Learning how to use emotions to communicate and connect with others

Educators recognize that music is one of humanity's most treasured and enduring experiences combining physical science and human emotional response. Local districts renewed their commitment to the arts but have difficulty holding to the high standards they once had for music education. Art is offered mostly after school and for a fee. Limited music instruction is available once a week during the school hours. Many families do not have resources for music education or to attend concerts. Teachers are over-burdened and must be assisted if we wish to have music in the curriculum.

Music education develops engaged, creative, expressive, responsive, and artistically literate citizens who connect through arts experiences that transcend historical, cultural, and societal contexts. We have seen that the impact of hearing a live orchestra, meeting a musician, or simply being exposed to and learning a musical instrument is immeasurable. NWS is committed to making these experiences possible for all young people and their families by providing free, high-quality, sequential music education and teacher training, to promote the development of critical cognitive functions necessary for navigating and existing in a complex world.

(Before the Show)


It is often helpful to remind students of appropriate audience etiquette by explaining and discussing why these rules of behavior are important.

Audience members should:

- listen carefully to the ushers, your teachers this gets everyone to their seats quickly and ensures a pleasant experience;
- walk single-file and hold hand-rails as you use steps this also keeps everyone safe;
- listen carefully to the performers they are working hard to entertain and inform you with lots of clues about the story;
- refrain from talking this allows everyone to enjoy the performance without being distracted;
- laugh if something is funny, but not too loudly you don't want to miss any dialogue;
- pay attention to the lighting, scenery, costumes, and music all of these elements help provide more details to tell the story in an interesting way; and
- applaud at the end this shows the performers that you respect and appreciate their work.

LEARN ABOUT SECTIONS OF THE ORCHESTRA



BRASS INSTRUMENTS are made of metal. A musician plays a brass instrument by blowing into it. The brass section is very loud. That is why it is at the back of the orchestra.



STRINGED INSTRUMENTS make music when their strings are plucked or played with a bow. String players sit up front.



WOODWIND INSTRUMENTS can be made of wood or metal. A musician plays a woodwind instrument by blowing into it. The woodwind section sits at the center of the orchestra.



PERCUSSION INSTRUMENTS make sounds when they are tapped, struck, or shaken. One percussion player may play a few instruments. They are usually not played at the same time.

Describe the Music:

Making Percussion Instruments

Percussion instruments are the most varied in the orchestra and 'inventing'/making them can be quite fun. You can turn really anything into a percussion instrument. Below are multiple ways to make homemade instruments.

Instruments you strike:

- Clay pots make an interesting instrument. Use the kind that has drain hole in the bottom. Using the hole, hang them from a string (run the string through the hole and tie a large paper clip, stick or another object on the end as a stop) and hit them with a wooden spoon. Be careful not to break them!
- Any pan or bowl can be an instrument by hitting them. Try different ones, but also don't neglect trying various stickers like spoons, drumsticks, pencils, nails, etc.
- Hit together a couple of sticks, pencils, anils, or bolts. Chopsticks also make an interesting sound when hit together
- Make a drum out of a coffee can or a trash can (metal or plastic). Or using a playdough or similar-sized can, stretch a balloon across the top and secure it with rubber bands for a drumhead.

Instruments you shake:

- Make a shaker by simply filling a container half full of rice, beans, seeds, pebbles, sand, small, buttons, metal soda tops, or anything loose of the sort, then secure the top.

Instruments you scrape:

- Anything can be scraped or rubbed together. Try taking copy paper and sandpaper and mixing them together to see what sound they create
- You can also take a comb or a hair pick with a stick and rub it together

Bring your home or classroom made instruments and play together in a percussion band:


- 1. Using metronome link above, start with low pitched instruments playing longer notes
- 2. Add shakers a few seconds later playing faster notes without changing metronome speed
- 3. Add scraping or rubbing instruments to create rhythmic patterns while the other 2 groups are playing.
- 4. Add drumming instrument to the ensemble

Conducting Gestures




We will have the whole auditorium conduct, so be prepared and some of you may even come to the stage to conduct the orchestra!

Using an online metronome link use it as a simple speed dial.

- 1. Pick a student in your class to sing a tune (They can create or compose one or sing their favorite song)
- 2. Pick a different member of the class to control the metronome (speed)

- 3. Ask other kids in a class how does speed change the tune?
- 4. Does the character or mood of the song change?
- 5. Do you think changing speed made it better?
- 6. Repeat as many times as desired.
