NEW WEST SYMPHONY ANNOUNCES 2026 SEASON AND RECEIVES NEA GRANT FOR AMERICA250 PROJECT

THOUSAND OAKS, Calif. — New West Symphony announced its 2026 season and confirmed it has been awarded a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) as part of Celebrating America250: Arts Projects Honoring the National Garden of American Heroes.

The 2026 season coincides with the semiquincentennial of the United States, marking the 250th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence. Througout the year, the Symphony will present performances reflecting the nation's cultural evolution, pairing American classics with cornerstone works of the symphonic repertoire.

The season opens with Rachmaninoff's Piano Concerto No. 2, and goes on to feature music by Beethoven, Bernstein, Rachmaninoff, Copland, Handel, Gershwin, Brahms, and others. The season also includes works connected to American opera and musical theater traditions that shaped America's artistic voice, with music by Stephen Sondheim, Leonard Bernstein, and John Adams. By popular request, cirque performers return to the stage, combining American orchestral favorites with feats of strength and agility. Musical styles rooted in American culture—including jazz, blues, and gospel—are featured throughout the season, which concludes with *Too Hot to Handel*, a gospel and soul reinterpretation of Handel's *Messiah*.

As part of its America250 programming supported by the NEA, New West Symphony is collaborating with the **Ronald Reagan Presidential Library** on a new symphonic work that sets President Ronald Reagan's most influential speeches to music from his Hollywood films, including *King's Row*, *This Is the Army*, as well as songs he loved. The project will be presented June 27, 2026, at the Ronald Reagan Presidential Library.

NEA Senior Advisor **Mary Anne Carter** said, "As our nation approaches its 250th anniversary, the National Endowment for the Arts is honored to support communities across the country in recognizing the individuals whose contributions have defined our history. New West Symphony's project in the Los Angeles Metropolitan Area plays a significant role in commemorating these heroes' legacies while affirming the enduring role of the arts in shaping America's future."

"Collaboration with the Ronald Reagan Presidential Library has been central to shaping this work," said **Natalia Staneva**, chief executive officer of New West Symphony. "Their partnership ensures that the artistic process is deeply informed by history and context."

"From the moment I heard the opening fanfare of Erich Korngold's score to the film *King's Row*, featuring a young Ronald Reagan, I sensed there was a powerful story waiting to be told," said **Michael Christie**, artistic and music director of New West Symphony. "Telling that story through music—much of it connected to Reagan's life in the Conejo Valley, where the Symphony serves its community—felt both natural and meaningful. The Ronald Reagan Presidential Library has been an essential partner in this journey, serving as an early home for the Symphony during the COVID-19 pandemic and supporting our *Global Sounds, Local Cultures* online festival. Over time, our shared work has led us toward America250 and the creation of a new piece inspired by Aaron Copland's *Lincoln Portrait*, reflecting the eras President Reagan lived through and preserved through extraordinary audio and visual history."
